

The Literacy Crisis Among Our Children—and Why It Matters for Eternity by Brad Harrub

God chose to reveal Himself through one form of media—the written word. Yes I know podcasts and videos exist, but only God’s Word is inspired! And let’s be honest for a moment, the Bible is not a simplistic book. It contains history, poetry, prophecy, theology, and complex argumentation. Understanding Scripture requires reading stamina, vocabulary knowledge, and comprehension skills.

- Consider passages like:
- Paul’s extended theological reasoning in Romans
 - The layered warnings and exhortations in Hebrews
 - The prophetic imagery of Daniel or Revelation
 - Even Jesus’ parables, which require inference and reflection

A child who struggles to comprehend basic texts will almost inevitably skip over difficult Bible passages, rely solely on surface-level summaries, or disengage altogether when Scripture demands effort. The problem today is not that Scripture has become harder—but that readers have become weaker. Scripture itself calls for active, thoughtful reading: “Meditate on it day and night” (Joshua 1:8). Meditation assumes comprehension. And comprehension assumes literacy If children are not trained to read deeply, they will struggle to rightly divide the Word of truth (2 Timothy 2:15). The result is not just ignorance, but vulnerability—to false teaching, shallow theology, and spiritual apathy.

Parents: God’s Designated Literacy Teachers: While schools play an important role, Scripture places the primary responsibility for instruction squarely on parents. “These words which I command you today shall be in your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children” (Deuteronomy 6:6-7). Decades of educational research confirm that parental involvement in reading is one of the strongest predictors of literacy success. Children who are read to regularly develop larger vocabularies, stronger comprehension skills, and greater motivation to read independently (Bus, van IJzendoorn, & Pellegrini, Joint Book Reading Makes for Success in Learning to Read, Review of Educational Research, 1995).

Literacy is not accidental. It is cultivated. So how can we be proactive for future generations?

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My home congregation is studying the book of Isaiah on Wednesday nights. The way Isaiah writes is amazing—he paints vivid word pictures. But some of the words and phrases Isaiah uses are different from our everyday language. And it got me to wondering how many of our young people can really comprehend what Isaiah was even saying?A quiet crisis is unfolding in America, and it affects not just in our classrooms, but also our homes and churches. Children today are reading less, understanding less, and possessing smaller vocabularies than previous generations. Sadly, we have become a sound bite nation that loves videos and video games. While educators worry about test scores and graduation rates, Christians must recognize something even more serious: this literacy decline directly affects a child’s ability to read, understand, and remain faithful to God’s Word.

The data is sobering. According to the National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP)—often called “the Nation’s Report Card”—40% of fourth graders and 33% of eighth graders score below “basic” reading levels (NAEP, 2022). “Below basic” does not mean struggling with advanced texts; it means difficulty identifying main ideas, understanding sequence, or making simple inferences from what is read (National Center for Education Statistics, NAEP Reading Report, 2022). Even more concerning, reading scores dropped sharply after 2020 (Covid) and have not recovered, reaching the lowest levels seen in decades (NCES, 2022). Research from the Annie E. Casey Foundation reports that nearly two-thirds (65%) of U.S. fourth graders are not proficient readers, a benchmark strongly predictive of future academic failure and disengagement (Annie E. Casey Foundation, Double Jeopardy: How Third-Grade Reading Skills and Poverty Influence High School Graduation, 2012).

Because they are not reading much, vocabulary size has declined as well. Linguistic research consistently reveals that children who read less are exposed to fewer words, which restricts vocabulary growth and comprehension ability (Cunningham & Stanovich, What Reading Does for the Mind, American Educator, 1998). In short, children are not just reading fewer pages—they are encountering fewer ideas.

A 4-Step Action Plan for Christian Parents by Brad Harrub

The following is a four step plan for parents to help their children become better readers. This is not all encompassing, but it will definitely give them a good headstart. It is OK for you as a parent to tell them to turn off the video games and encourage them to grab a book.

1. Restore Daily Reading in the Home! Set aside time each day for reading—especially during the early years. Read real books, not just screens. Physical books slow the mind, improve retention, and encourage deeper engagement [This is purely opinion, but I am a big fan of young and older alike, using a hard copy of the Bible.]
 2. Read Scripture Aloud and Talk About It! Hearing Scripture strengthens language processing and comprehension. Ask questions: What does this mean? Why did God say it this way? Teach children that the Bible is meant to be understood—not skimmed.
 3. Build Vocabulary Intentionally! Stop and explain unfamiliar words—both in books and in the Bible. Vocabulary is a gateway to theology. A child who doesn't understand words like covenant, sacrifice, redemption, or justification will struggle to grasp the gospel itself.
 4. Model What You Want Them to Become! Children who see parents reading—especially reading Scripture—are far more likely to become readers themselves. Literacy is caught as much as it is taught.
- Conclusion: The literacy crisis is not merely an educational concern—it is a salvation issue. If our children cannot read well, they will struggle to know God well. And if they struggle to know His Word, they will struggle to remain faithful when life and doctrine become difficult. Parents must act. Not tomorrow. Not when school improves. Now. If they can't read well, they will not be able to defend their faith well! Teach them to read. Teach them to understand. Teach them to love God's
