You can Have Purpose and Meaning in Christ

Every person longs to understand *why* they are here. Many search for meaning in career, success, or relationships, yet true purpose can only be found in knowing and serving God. Scripture reminds us, "For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them" (Ephesians 2:10). Our purpose begins when we realize that we were created by God and for God — to live a life that glorifies Him.

The world often defines purpose by achievement, but the Bible defines it by faithfulness. Jesus said, "Seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be added to you" (Matthew 6:33). When we make God our priority, everything else in life finds its proper place. True meaning isn't discovered in chasing what we want, but in aligning our hearts with what God wants.

Finding your purpose also means serving others. Paul wrote, "Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others" (Philippians 2:4). When we use our talents to help others and share Christ's love, we fulfill the good works God has designed for us. Purpose is not hidden — it's lived out daily in obedience, compassion, and faith.

When we walk with Christ, our purpose becomes clearer through spiritual growth and daily faithfulness. Paul reminds us, "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect" (Romans 12:2). The more we study God's Word, pray, and live by His guidance, the more we understand the direction He has for our lives. Our meaning is not found in temporary things but in living as disciples who reflect Christ's character in every situation.

Living with purpose also gives us strength and hope through life's challenges. Even when the path ahead seems uncertain, God's plan remains steady. "And we know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to his purpose" (Romans 8:28, ESV). When we trust that God is working in every season — in joy, in sorrow, in waiting — we can face each day with confidence. Our lives have meaning because we belong to Him, and every moment can be used to honor Christ and draw others to His saving grace.

Take time this week to pray and reflect on how you can better serve in God's kingdom. Ask yourself: *Am I using my life to glorify God?* Look for opportunities to encourage, teach, and serve. As Jesus said, "*Whoever loses his life for my sake will find it*" (Matthew 16:25). True purpose and lasting meaning are found only in Him.

Your Voice is a Powerful Part of our Worship

A cappella singing allows every voice to join together in unity and praise. "I will tell of your name to my brothers; in the midst of the congregation, I will sing your praise." (Hebrews 2:12). Each person becomes an active participant, blending their heart and voice in true worship. The focus stays on the words, the message, and the shared faith that lifts us all closer to God.

One great blessing of a cappella singing is congregational unity. When voices rise together, there is just believers joined in one purpose. As Paul reminded the Corinthians, "I will sing praise with my spirit, but I will sing with my mind also" (1 Corinthians 14:15). This shared understanding turns our singing into teaching, encouragement, and fellowship.

A cappella singing also keeps the emphasis on the heart, where true melody begins. We are not relying on instruments to stir emotion, but on the truths we sing and the faith behind them. This makes our worship deeply personal and spiritual—"the fruit of lips that acknowledge his name" (Hebrews 13:15). Each voice, whether strong or soft, becomes a living offering of praise to God.

Let us sing with joy, sing with understanding, and sing from the heart—your voice is a vital part of worship that honors God and strengthens the church.
